

# From the Principal

Dear Treetops Community,

Thank you for assisting us with such a smooth start to the year. Our new staff have felt very welcome and the changes we have made across the school seem to have been well-received.

The renovations of our Children's House playground are progressing, and our students are already enjoying the new options available to them.



Interest in Treetops remains strong and we have started the year with 149 students enrolled, 60 of whom are in our Secondary school. For reference, historically Treetops usually has about 35-40 students enrolled in Secondary. This year we extended our already broad WACE (Western Australian Certificate of Education) offerings to include Music and Politics & Law. Our peripatetic programme has also grown this year with 53 students enrolled in 11 classes being run over the week. Many students are in multiple classes complementing our substantial school-based music programme.

Over the break, most Treetops staff competed two days of mental health first aid training. Whilst being primarily concerned with adolescent care, the training has broad application. Staff also attended a one-day team building exercise at the Swan Valley Adventure Centre. This enjoyable day not surprisingly came with many opportunities to overcome fear, collaborate, and equally importantly, have a lot of fun!



I am looking forward to what promises to be a really good year for our school.

## Children's House

The Montessori curriculum encompasses all aspects of the child's wellbeing, including social and emotional intelligence. It nurtures the <a href="whole">whole</a> child. While a traditional school may focus mainly on developing a child's cognitive abilities, the Montessori curriculum aims to develop every aspect of a child. These aspects include the four major elements that make up what Montessori refers to as the whole child: physical, emotional, social, and cognitive.

#### **Physical**

Learning and movement are interconnected. Children are moving around and staying physically active throughout the day. Outdoor play allows children to be exposed to the beautiful things that nature has to offer. The outdoor environment is also the perfect place for children to use their senses.







#### **Emotional**

Learning how to recognise and manage emotions is a very important life skill. Because many conflicts in life are a result of a person feeling hurt by another's actions, it is crucial for children to learn at an early age that their actions can affect other people.

When students get into a disagreement in Children's House, they learn how to talk about their feelings in order to resolve the issue peacefully, using the 'Peace Rose'. Children also learn how to recognise what emotions others are feeling by looking at body language and facial expressions. Through the development of emotional intelligence, children are able to form stronger bonds with others.





#### Social

One of the main features of a Montessori school is multi-age classrooms, which allows students to interact with children of varying ages, and helps young children feel more comfortable with older children. Older children also benefit from being in multi-age classrooms because it develops their leadership skills by being able to serve as mentors to the younger students and assist them with their work.





#### Cognitive

When provided with developmentally appropriate materials in a carefully prepared environment, children are motivated to learn. Adult correction and praise disrupt the child's concentration. Concentration in turn, is necessary for cognitive development.



SO HOW CAN YOU SUPPORT YOUR CHILD AT HOME?

#### Life Skills

Even young children are capable of pitching in around the house! By teaching them to take care of themselves and the space around them at a young age, you will set your child up to be considerate and capable. Consider little jobs like getting themselves dressed, preparing lunch, setting and cleaning up after a meal, packing away toys, cleaning, and carrying their bag to school.









#### **Encourage Concentration**

This is a skill you can start cultivating in your child when they are young. You can do this by identifying what they are interested in, then setting them up with the materials and space they need to explore it more thoroughly, with activities that can be done without assistance and which encourage independent play. <a href="https://www.theparentingjunkie.com/10-ways-to-encourage-independent-play/">https://www.theparentingjunkie.com/10-ways-to-encourage-independent-play/</a> (this is a wonderful article on how to create a suitable environment)









#### Sleep

Create good sleep habits and routines. 3-5 years olds require between 10 and 13 hours of sleep per night.

#### Language

Encourage oral language through stories and conversations, insisting on full sentences where possible.

Our staggered entry is now complete, and our new students have settled in well. The older children have been so helpful in setting the example and helping our new children feel welcome!

# Primary School




# Karri






# **Digital Technologies**


