



Japanese

An effective Languages program not only introduces students to a new language and culture, it also adds to their skills and understanding of their native language. Marri students have been learning about folktales in Japanese. We first analysed common features of folktales and different ways they can be told.

We then looked in depth at one Japanese folktale, including different versions of the story. Students are working in small groups to present one scene of the story. This aligns to the Creating strand in the WA Curriculum: Languages. Marri students are excited to present this to a younger class at the end of the term.



At the other end of the school, Secondary students have been learning different grammatical features in Japanese, including superlatives, conjunctions, adjectives and adverbs to improve the structure and appeal of their language production. These are just two of many ways in which learning a second language assists with the knowledge of your first language.

Science

It's been an exciting ride in our Year 7&8 Science class as we dive into the fascinating world of forces. From calculating friction to buoyancy and density experiments, we've been busy uncovering the secrets behind the invisible powers that shape our world. We kicked things off by exploring the mysterious world of friction. Who knew that the simple act of sliding an object across different surfaces could lead to such cool discoveries?

Our hands-on experiments had us testing the resistance between various materials and learning how to calculate it. From rough roads to slippery slopes, we've been having a blast studying how friction works. To wrap up our latest adventures, we delved into the concept of net forces through an interactive simulation. We discovered how multiple forces act on an object, and how they all add up to determine its motion. Think of it like a cosmic tug-of-war but with magnets, ropes, and more! Understanding net forces is like holding the key to predicting how things will move.





Hold onto your lab coats because we've got something awesome lined up for the next few weeks – a parachute engineering project! You heard it right. We're going to design, build, and test our very own parachutes. It's the chance to apply all the cool stuff we've learned about forces and see it in action. Get ready to drop some egg-citement (pun intended) from the sky!

PROJECT UPDATE





Scott Street Bridge, Helena Valley

The refurbished <u>Scott Street bridge</u> was due to be reopened to the public by the end of October 2023.

Unfortunately, conflicts with Water Corporation infrastructure, steel shortages, inclement weather and additional scope have impacted the completion timeframe for this bridge refurbishment project. This means work will now continue until January 2024, with the current traffic management remaining in place.

The concrete deck for the eastern carriageway and wider footpath is scheduled for pouring this weekend, after which time they will reopen. Demolition and reconstruction of the western carriageway will then begin. We thank road users and pedestrians for their ongoing patience as works continue on this important upgrade.

This project is being undertaken by Main Roads on behalf of the Shire of Mundaring, with funding from the Australian Government's Roads to Recovery program.
